And as they were frightened and bowed their faces to the ground, the men said to them, "Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Luke 24:5-6a

I have a confession to make. As your new Senior Pastor, I couldn't help but think about what it is that I could share that would make a good first impression. So, after much thought and deliberation, here's what I came up with.

I used to work in a cemetery.

How's that for an attempt at making a good first impression? At least it's a good conversation starter, depending on what you consider to be a "good" conversation starter.

It's true, though. For six summers during high school and college, I worked 40 hours a week in a large cemetery cutting grass, weed-eating, trimming shrubs, hauling brush, and (my favorite) cleaning tombstones; and during the course of those six summers, never once did any of the local "residents" bother me.

Never once did I have an encounter with anyone who was buried there. Not once did anyone in that cemetery get in the way of my work, and not once did I ever see a grave suddenly become vacated and empty. What I quickly discovered is that, if you can get past all of the scary cemetery scenes that we find in stories, movies, or books, cemeteries are actually quite peaceful. The reason is simple. Contrary to at least one popular television series, dead people don't come to life.

Now, I realize that I probably didn't need to point this out, as harsh it sounds, but if I were to go and visit the graves of my mom and dad, I know that their bodies are still going to be where we placed them. That's just the way things have worked since Abel was killed by his brother, Cain, and it's the way it appeared it would remain until that day when grace burst forth.

That's exactly what the women discovered on that first Easter morning. What was once considered a cold hard fact about how things work here on earth had now been completely shattered and upended by the same Jesus whose birth we just celebrated.

That's why the season of Christmas and Epiphany remain as important as ever. With the arrival of our Savior, Jesus, and Him revealing Himself as the One who has conquered sin and death, the grave no longer has the final say and everything has been turned upside down.

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The temporal has been made eternal, and a new hope rises out of the depths of despair and grief with the words of those angels who may have very well been a part of the heavenly host who proclaimed the birth of Jesus. "Why do you look for the living among the dead?"

When grace was ushered in by way of Jesus, even cemeteries would never again be seen as the final resting place for any of those whom Christ has claimed; because, when grace was ushered in through the One born to us in Bethlehem, the glorious song of heaven announcing the arrival of our Savior was destined to blend itself with the shouts of Alleluia!

As we continue to celebrate the arrival of our Savior, Jesus, may the Holy Spirit now move us to not only sing and live out our songs of "Gloria", but also our songs of "Alleluia"—because the two always go hand in hand.

The Pro-Life Movement Has a New Pro-Life Flag! In July, the Pro-Life Flag Project revealed the winning design: a mother's hands circled around a baby's footprints with two pink and blue stripes over a white background. Brazilian graphic designer Nanda Gasperini, of Sao Paulo, designed the winning flag. According to organizers, the white background on the flag represents non-violence and the innocence of the unborn child, while the baby's feet



are based on the iconic Precious Feet pin, a symbol of the pro-life movement for decades. The pink hands surrounding the feet represent the pregnant mother protecting her child, and the heart between the baby's feet symbolizes the pro-life movement's love for both mother and child. The stripes emphasize that two distinct human lives are present in a pregnancy. They also form an equal sign, symbolizing human rights and equality for every human being.
