A "Hands On" God...and a "Hands On" People

They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Luke 24:31-34

I realize you probably don't expect to hear this from a former science teacher, but I really wanted nothing to do with science when I was in grade school. And the reason? Science class almost always meant reading our text book and answering questions. I suppose it worked for some, but for a kid like me who didn't particularly enjoy reading, this teaching technique did little to encourage my love for science... *until* high school.

When I entered my sophomore year of high school, I quickly discovered that science was more interesting than I thought, and my entire perspective changed when we actually began to <u>do</u> things in class. That's when we dissected in Biology class, made aspirin in Chemistry class, and did so many other "hands on" experiments that led me to discover and really begin to learn. Yes, "Hands On Science" changed my world, so much so that it led me to actually consider becoming a Science teacher.

I have to admit, I'm still pretty much a "hands on" kind of person. I like to see how things work and I've always enjoyed working on home projects. I've also grown to be the kind of person who doesn't like a lot of talk with little or no action to back it up. (I'll credit my father for this one. I can't tell you how many times he told me that "talk is cheap.")

That's why I have to confess that I feel the same when it comes to how we live out our Christian lives. It seems that there is a tendency for people like us to *talk about* the importance of witnessing and discipling with little to back it up. It's not that the opportunities don't exist. In fact, check out some of these staggering statistical facts that suggest otherwise.

Did you know that it's still true that more people worship in Christian churches in Africa on any given Sunday than in all of North America (US and Canada)? Did you know that more people worship on a Sunday morning in China (a nation with a history of attempting to stamp out Christianity) than in all of Europe? Did you know that the same is now true regarding Sunday morning worshipers in China compared to Sunday morning worshipers in the United States? And did you know that, according to a Barna research study from about 15 years ago, one-half of all churches in America had not added one new member through "conversion" during any given year, while only 5% of the churches were growing by conversion (new Christians), 15% were growing by transfer (Christians moving from one congregation to another), and 80% had reached a plateau or were in decline.

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Now, I'd like to tell you that the statistics are getting better, but they're not. Clearly, the Christian Church in America is facing a challenge (or should I say an "opportunity"), which means that the mission field is no longer overseas as we once thought; it is here around us. In fact, the United States remains one of the fastest growing mission fields in the world -- which is giving congregations like ours a great opportunity to be a "hands on" church in the Macomb community. In other words, we are being given opportunities to point others to the One who has demonstrated through His life, death, and resurrection that He is a "hands on" Savior.

Having been a part of this family that we call St. Peter Lutheran Church and School for about four months, I can't emphasize enough how excited I am to see the Holy Spirit leading us to put our faith into ongoing action. In fact, I look forward to us being creative in becoming a "hands on" congregation that looks for ways to speak out, live out, and touch the hearts and lives of those around us with the saving and lifegiving message of the Cross and Empty Tomb.

You see, one thing that I can still see is that, just as I was ready (whether I realized it or not) to experience how "hands on science" could change things for me when I was a teenager, our family members, friends, and neighbors are waiting to see Jesus Christ as a "hands on Savior" who is relevant and life-changing for them.

The harvest fields are still ripe, and this gives us the opportunity to live out the new lives we've been given through the life-changing cross and empty tomb of Jesus...the One who still bears the victorious marks of the nails, proving that He is a hands-on Savior.

As we live in the light of the forgiveness, salvation, and new life that was brought to life through the Cross of Christ and His empty tomb, may the Holy Spirit now lead us to be a congregation who LIVES out this saving truth. Because...Jesus really is alive! He truly <u>IS</u> Risen!

So...let's live it out as His "hands on" people!

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A Devotion from Pastor Arendell

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This is my favorite Easter story. Please bear with me because it starts out sad, but it does get better just like Easter. There was couple who I was close to who had tried to have children and could not. Eventually they went to medical means to have children. It took a couple of years, but one day he came into my office and his face was aglow. In his excitement, he had a hard time getting the words out. "Pastor, I am going to be father! I can't believe it! I thank God! Can you lift up a thanksgiving prayer this weekend?" I said most certainly and we will pray right now. I remember his wife being so excited and how on Easter Sunday she was so joyful knowing in another six months she would have the baby she had waited most of her adult life for.

The next morning, I got a telephone call that woke me up. On the other end was the same voice that was so excited a few weeks before. This time there was no excitement. It was replaced with tears. He said, "Pastor, we lost the baby. Can you come to the hospital?" I remember sitting in the hospital room with a couple who just had their hopes dashed and hearts broken. It was the saddest hospital visit I have ever made.

Now the good part! A little more than a year later they were standing with me next to the baptismal font. She was holding their one-month-old baby daughter and both of them were beaming. For me, it was the most impactful baptism I have ever done. With the memory of what happened just over a year prior still in mind, I was getting ready to baptize the first born of a mother and father who thought they could not have children. My hands shook and my voice cracked as I poured the water on the baby's head and said, "I baptize you..."

I learned there is no situation that God cannot change into good. There is nothing that He cannot change into a praise for how good He is.

John 11:25 Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die."

There is nothing God cannot resurrect from broken dreams to broken hearts. Jesus is the resurrection and life not only on the day He reappears but for every day.

April Focus: Special Needs

An excerpt from Focus on the Family- Canada

Every woman who becomes pregnant or adopts a child hopes for a healthy baby. Many pray fervently for that blessing, and most will have that prayer answered. But what about those who receive a different answer: a child who needs so much more than the "average" child? Parents to whom God has given a child with special needs have special needs, too. They have an extraordinary need for energy, patience, faith, trust, resources and relationships.



Energy If you are the parent of a special needs child, you already know just how rigorously parenting tests your energy levels. It's essential that you take good physical care of yourself, maintaining healthy nutrition and making time for exercise – especially outdoors, in fresh air, when possible. Your commitment to caring for your child is your primary calling.

<u>Patience</u> Caring for a special needs child will undoubtedly test your patience, whether it's patience with your child, the medical system or with people who don't understand. It's your choice whether to view this as a frustration, or as an opportunity to develop Christ-like character. Over time, the Lord will grow your soul as you wait on Him for each challenge, each positive step of growth, or each disappointment endured.

<u>Faith</u> Is God good when difficulties surround us...when we have been up all night with a baby who needs 24-hour care? This is a time to seek God in ways you may never have before. The psalmist invites you to taste and see that the Lord is good (**Psalm 34:8**). Pour out your questions, your pain, your fears to Him and experience His care for you. "Cast all your cares upon Him because He cares for you (**1 Peter 5:7**)." You will need God more than ever, and as you seek Him, you will find He is closer than ever.

<u>Trust</u> We all feel better when we have some measure of control over our circumstances. For you, as the parent of a special needs child, control may seem very elusive. Doctors cannot always predict what lies ahead. Different treatments may be attempted until something "works," and your child's condition may change unexpectedly. It will be important to find professionals you can trust to provide two things: professional expertise and care, and recommendations based on the best interests of your child and family. You should also trust your own instincts. Only you know your child best; trust your gut when you sense something is amiss. Then ask for help.

Resources It has been said that it takes a village to raise a child, and this is especially true for a special needs child. You will need to educate yourself; books, articles and judicious browsing on the Internet will help you find much that may prove helpful. Professional resources, including doctors, counsellors and therapists, may all become part of your support team. Seek the best possible information and help – for your sake and your child's. Be an advocate for your child – ask questions, and don't accept pat answers. Ask for support and access anything that can be made available to you – whether it is respite care, nursing assistance, financial aid, counselling or just good information.

Relationships Your most important relationship is with God. Spend time with Him regularly, sharing everything about your situation with Him freely. The next important relationship is your relationship with your spouse (unless you are a single parent). Parenting a special needs child can be hard on a marriage. Take time to care for one another and recognize each other's needs. It is easy to assume that your spouse will wait while the child absorbs all your attention. But don't make him or her wait too long... refocus on one another regularly. Find other parents who have gone down this road, either through local support groups, through your team of professionals or by checking out online support groups. Finally, be candid with family and friends about how they can be there for you. Often, they want to help, but are not sure how. Be specific about what they can do to support you and your child.

TREASURER'S REPORT

<u>Update on the Mortgage and the Moving Forward Campaign:</u> As of February 28, 2022, the Church Extension Fund loan balance was \$1,689,544. This is a reduction of 64.5% since we first started tracking the Campaign in November 2018.

- The number of pledge units (individuals or families) to the Campaign was 444.
- Approximately 72% of those who made a pledge to the Campaign actually contributed.
- Approximately 13% of those who pledged have given more than their pledged amount.
- Approximately 15% of those who contributed to the Campaign had not made a pledge.
- Gifts under \$1,000 represented 43.8% of Campaign dollars.
- Gifts ranging from \$1,000 to \$9,999 represented 44.5% of Campaign dollars.
- Gifts ranging from \$10,000 to \$39,999 represented 10.4% of Campaign dollars.
- Gifts in excess of \$40,000 represented 1.2% of Campaign dollars.
- In addition, the Campaign began with two legacy gifts, each more than \$250,000.

<u>Budget Update:</u> Here is a summary of income and expenses, as of **January 31, 2022**, compared to the same period of the last fiscal year (July 2020 through January 2021).

- **Church Income** was \$1,397,193, compared to \$1,414,388 for the same seven-month period of last year. This is a decrease of 1.2% or \$17,195.
- Church Expenses totaled \$736,372, compared to \$1,065,359 last year. This is a decrease of 30.9% or \$328,987.
- School and Preschool Income and Expenses were not finalized in time for this report and will be included next month. (Enrollment data is impressive. Day School enrollment for 2021-22 is 412, compared to 351 in 2020-21 and 331 in 2019-20. Preschool enrollment for 2021-22 is 201, compared to 175 in 2020-21.)

<u>Budget Preparation:</u> The Board of Finance is currently working with all budget units to prepare the 2022-23 budget.
