"What if...?"

"But when the Helper comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth, who proceeds from the Father, he will bear witness about me. And you also will bear witness, because you have been with me from the beginning." John 15:26-27

Back when I first began serving as a pastor, I remember a small outreach campaign in which a number of the Milwaukee-area Christian churches were taking part. I first noticed this when I began to see banners popping up on church lawns that asked: "What if it's true?" I admit that the signs did well to pique my curiosity, but I was a little uncomfortable with the way the question was worded.

Remember...I had just come out of the seminary where I was reminded on more than one occasion that we are called to proclaim the truth in a direct manner that never leaves anyone with questions, so I was keenly aware of two things when it came to these "What if it's true?" signs. One, they didn't appear to mesh with what I had been taught and, two, they were still managing to stir my taste to try anything and everything in order to reach the lost.

After looking into things, I discovered that the campaign was actually designed to reach those who were in the midst of questioning God or struggling in their walk of faith. The idea was to get people to stop asking "What if it's <u>not</u> true?" (as so many are apt to do these days) and, instead, take a completely different angle by asking: What if it <u>is</u> true?!

What if Jesus really is who He says He is? What if Jesus *is* God in the flesh? What if Jesus really did all those things recorded in the Bible – miracles and all? What if Jesus really did die to take away our sins? What if our sins are the obstacles that God says they are? What if Jesus really did rise from the dead... ascend into heaven...and now reigns as the Almighty One – the King of kings and Lord of lords? And... what if I went on and on asking every "what if" question I can think of?

I admit that asking these questions still makes me a little uneasy, but I also have to admit that maybe we **should** ask these questions. Not to question God, but more-so in order to search out the truth given in His Word and rediscover that there are NO "**What Ifs**" when it comes to who God is and what He has revealed.

You see...when we take time to dive into Scripture, we discover that everything about God and His Word is absolutely true concerning Jesus. And if all these things are true of Christ, then there are other "what ifs" which are also absolutely true. Like...what if Jesus really did send His Holy Spirit to do all the things He said He would do? And...what if the Holy Spirit has every intention of using people like us here at St. Peter to do His work, spread His Word, and reach out to those who have yet to have their "what if" questions answered?

Following are the 14 LWML Michigan District **2022-2024 Grant Requests** which Michigan District President, Pastor David Maier, approved and will be voted on at the LWML convention in July. The biennium **goal is \$260,000**, and the biennium **requests are \$289,500**. Each delegate usually votes for eight or nine of the proposals as the requests are for more than the set goal. The ones that get the most votes are those that become funded up to \$260,000. Please contact St. Peter delegate, Joyce Schwark, **before July** if you would like her to vote for any particular grant request.

- 1. Enriching lives of children and families in Michigan's Urban Communities.
- 2. Lutheran Heritage Foundation- God's Word for Teenagers around the world. This Grant would support the translation and publishing of a 300 page book, "God's Word for You" targeting the teen population.
- 3. Gifts for All God's Children year-round program replication to additional churches. This Grant would help to deepen the relationship with 5 more congregations in the Detroit LCMS area.
- 4. MOST Ministries "Shepherding the Sheep" Allows 5 Pastors and 4 members of each of their congregations to help with expenses of short-term mission trip.
- 5. Lutheran Braille Workers
- 6. Multi-Ethnic and Multi-Generational Church, Cross Point Church, LCMS, Ministry and Missions Cost. This Grant would help fund the initial cost for the church pastor, worship group, a music and youth ministry, and an outreach/ evangelism team.
- 7. Family of God Lutheran Church in Southwest Detroit. This Grant would provide purchasing a used trailer to store a tent, tables, chairs, etc., needed to continue Sunday worship of homeless.
- 8. Orphan Grain Train- Michigan Help to ship two international shipments of clothing, quilts, medical supplies, etc.
- 9. Scholarships for Deaf Students St. Martin Lutheran School for the Deaf is the only Lutheran Deaf school in Michigan. Offers tuition assistance through scholarships.
- 10. Lutheran Special Education Ministries. This Grant could fund new and upgraded programs in Michigan and across the country.
- 11. Passenger Van Outreach for St. Paul Community Lutheran Church, Pontiac. Grant needed to purchase a 15 passenger van. The church has 200 members, with a weekly attendance of 30 due to transportation constraints.
- 12. "Worship Anew" weekly LCMS television worship services on Sunday mornings. This Grant would allow expanding the sharing of Christ's love in the Michigan District.
- 13. Scholarships for female students studying to be a Deaconess or Professional Church Worker: This Grant would support Michigan women preparing in any of the Concordia Universities for careers in LCMS professional church work.
- 14. Concordia Fort Wayne Indiana Seminarians food/clothing bank.

Anyone can give toward these very worthy Grants via the MITE boxes which are available at the Information Desk in the Narthex or in the Church Office. (The name originated from the Bible story of the Widow's Mite.) Just deposit your pennies, nickels, dimes, or quarters into the box and periodically bring it back to the church office or to Women's Ministry meetings and pick up another empty box.

GriefShare Tuesday evening, May 17, a new GriefShare cycle was initiated at St. Peter. Many churches do not offer this ministry during the summer, but because we are blessed with eight veteran facilitators plus two newly-trained leaders, we are able to continue reaching out to grieving people. Eight people from the community attended the first meeting. All of them are mourning the loss of a spouse or another special adult in their lives, and so they bonded quickly with each other as they shared their experiences and their deep sorrow.

St. Peter has offered GriefShare since 2017, offering three thirteen-week cycles every year. During the height of covid, we "met" via zoom. If was not ideal, but we were still able to offer hope as even more people were grieving the loss of a loved one. One hundred sixty-three people have bravely walked through our door to seek healing as they long to move "From Mourning to Joy," the title of our manual. Most of these participants are not members of St. Peter, and some of them have no church affiliation. Death was never part of God's plan at creation, but we live in a fallen world where death is a part of every life, and we are privileged to walk beside people as they mourn. May God be praised and glorified as He uses our St. Peter family to minister to His children.

June Focus: Abortion/Past Abortion

The abortion issue has been legal since Roe v. Wade in 1973 and is again before the Supreme Court now waiting to see if it will be overturned. But being overturned *does not* mean abortion will be illegal and Planned Parenthood will go away. It will only mean that the states, not the federal government, will make the abortion guidelines.

Abortion does not only extinguish a new life, it also affects the mother, father, and families involved.

Yes, there are those who use abortion as a means of birth control and can justify to themselves that it is only a blob of tissue. But what about the young lady who finds herself pregnant and is wrestling with the thought of aborting her baby? Her thoughts run rampant—how can she raise this child when her dream was to go to college, get a degree, and have a career? And after that, get married and have a family. After all it's only a blob of tissue, right? But how can this be when the Bible says that God formed us in the womb (Isaiah 49:5, Jeremiah 1:5, and Psalm 139:13)? TREASURER'S REPORT

MORTGAGE UPDATE: As of April 30, 2022, the Church Extension Fund loan balance was \$1,649,720. This is a reduction of 65.3% since we first started tracking the Moving Forward Campaign in November 2018.

BUDGET UPDATE: Following is a summary of income and expenses, as of April 30, 2022. This information is compared to the same ten-month period of the prior fiscal year (July 2020 through April 2021).

Church Income stands at \$1,952,143 compared to \$1,959,653 last year. This is a decrease of 0.4% or \$7,510. Previous reports have noted a small decline in church income this year. This decline has now been almost eliminated.

Church Expenses now total \$1,086,498, compared to \$1,591,145. This is a decrease of 31.7% or \$504,647.

Day School Income (tuition and miscellaneous income) now totals \$1,518,939, compared to \$1,218,114 last year. This is an increase of 24.7% or \$330,825.

Day School Expenses (salaries, benefits, and expenses) now totals \$1,778,230, compared to \$1,419,276 last year. This is an increase of 25.3% or \$358,954.

Preschool Tuition now totals \$288,219 while miscellaneous income totals \$131,282, for total income of \$419,501. Miscellaneous income includes a one-time non-budgeted Michigan grant for payroll in the amount of \$127,990.65. We are not reporting income comparisons to last year due to different accounting systems prior to merging the Preschool with the Day School at the beginning of the current fiscal year.

Preschool Expenses now total \$274,877. Expenses include salaries, benefits, and related educational items. As with income, we are not reporting expense comparisons to last year due to different accounting systems.

UPCOMING REPORTS IN KEYNOTES: The next report will be in mid-summer and will include end of the fiscal year data and analysis. It will also include a summary of changes made at St. Peter in account analysis, practices and reporting in the Business Office. With Dr. Robert Costa's assistance, several changes have and are being made to move all income and expense reporting to a GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles) compliant format.
